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


Wendy wanted to play outside. "The wind is blowing and it is cold," said Mom. "You must dress warmly."

Wendy ran outside. A strong wind blew her beanie right off her head. She tried to catch it, but it flew away.




She ran home to tell her mom that her beanie had disappeared. "Don't worry, Wendy. Maybe someone will find your beanie and use it."
