### 1. Introduction

The movement of people across national borders is a defining feature of our modern world. Globalisation has significantly increased mobility, enabling individuals to pursue education and employment opportunities beyond their home countries. International labour migration, skills mobility, the recognition of qualifications, and employability are closely linked and present complex challenges for both education and labour markets. Labour migration is often driven by unequal economic opportunities, prompting individuals to seek better prospects abroad. However, obstacles such as skills mismatches, inadequate recognition of qualifications, and restrictive policies can hinder the potential benefits of cross-border movement.

The ability to transfer education and skills is essential to address labour shortages, especially in knowledge-based industries. Nevertheless, issues like visa restrictions, xenophobia, and the lack of mutually recognised qualifications remain significant barriers. In addition, the rapid pace of the Fourth Industrial Revolution is changing skill demands, highlighting the importance of lifelong learning to remain relevant in the job market.

To address these challenges, governments, international organisations, educational institutions, and the private sector must work together to develop policies that promote the portability of skills and improve the recognition of qualifications. Such efforts are vital to achieving fair and sustainable outcomes for both sending and receiving countries.

This global mobility underscores the growing importance of recognising qualifications and acquiring relevant skills that support employability in an interconnected world. A number of global trends are shaping education and employment policies, directly influencing how qualifications and skills are evaluated and valued across borders.

The G20 EdWG Seminar on 'Mutual Recognition of Qualifications' serves as a specialised knowledge-sharing platform, bringing together academic, policy, and other experts to engage in focused discussions on the key education challenges, innovations, and best practices of:

- International labour migration, skills mobility and employability;
- · Mutual recognition of qualifications; and
- Innovative approaches to micro-credentials for lifelong learning and employability.

This and other seminars are based on the priorities identified for the G20 formal meetings and provide an opportunity for stakeholders, including policymakers and researchers, to exchange insights, foster capacity-building, and generate policy recommendations that inform formal G20 deliberations. Unlike high-level official meetings, these forums emphasise academic discourse, evidence-based policy exchange, and strategic collaboration. The Seminar format include keynote speeches, expert panels, and interactive sessions, ensuring a dynamic and inclusive approach to shaping local and global education priorities.

Facilitate in-depth discussions on the three topics;




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Strengthen collaboration between countries and stakeholders, fostering global education innovation;
